Journal of Arctic Studies" (JAS) we are presenting a collection of papers from different fields of Arctic studies, such as research on human-animal- / humanenvironmental-relations (e.g. history of reindeer breeding, role of fishing in the neolithic period, bowhead whaling — especially according to interpretations of the International Polar Year Collections, crane dances — among the Kalmyks, traditional knowledge of the Chuckchee regarding the walrus / walrus hunting on Chukotka peninsula), archaeology, history of sciences (e.g. history of Siberian petroglyph studies in Imperial Russia), researches on cultural changes (e.g. of the peoples at the reaches of the Lower Amur) and several aspects of folk art as well as demography, economic and educational development (e.g. the effects of language policy—a case study on Tuvinian language in Tuva Republic), the relations of the "Near Arctic peoples" of China and adjacent regions to the environment and natural resources in past and present or the current situation of the ethnic groups in question (mostly Altaic groups of China, but also Nivkhs and Chukotka natives).
