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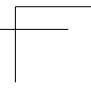
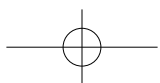
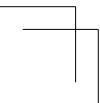
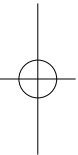
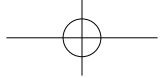
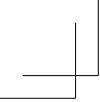
Preface

Dear Reader, it is our pleasure to inform you that herewith the fifth issue of our periodical “北冰洋研究期刊. Journal of Arctic Studies” (JAS) can be presented. This is now also formally divided into a number of thematic sections for the first time: 1.) Environmental history and archaeology, 2.) Linguistic research, 3.) Studies of Chinese Arctic peoples, 4.) Indigenous resettlement, 5.) Frontier observations, 6.) Book reviews and 7.) Academic events.

This structure, as well as within the individual sections, reflects the diversity of topics covered in the journal by contributors from numerous countries around the world. The spectrum here ranges — just to pick a few examples at random — from archaeological findings in Siberia and Alaska and their significance for the Na Dene-Yeniseian hypothesis within the first section (here the contribution by Ben Potter “Archaeological patterning in Northeast Asia and Northwest North America: An examination of the Dene-Yeniseian hypothesis”), the treatment of language change and language choice among contemporary speakers of Tuvan language in contact with Russian language in the second section (here the article by Na Heya “Tuvan language change in daily life”), and a review of the present situation and the continued existence of the reindeer-Evenki of China and the perspectives on this against the background of the economical change of this group (the contribution by Gong Yu “Investigation on the survival status of Reindeer Ewenki in China”) as well as an investigation of the special relationship between dogs and humans in the modern context of tourism based on field research in Greenland (here Daniela Tommasini’s contribution “The dog-hunter alliance in two hunting communities of Greenland”) up to a report on the Inner Mongolian Society for academic Research on the Evenki People (by Liu Hua).

The editors would like to express once again their wish that this fifth issue of our “Journal of Arctic Studies” will also be of interest to you.



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
